This submission includes 4 letters; I am submitting them together for convenience.

It is my pleasure to nominate Sally Eppert for IMTA 2023 Teacher of the Year. Sally epitomizes what it means to be a professional independent teacher, running a successful home studio in Fishers for over 35 years. And while she could now rest on her laurels, she is starting a multi-instrument music academy.

Sally has been a steadfast, dedicated presence in the piano teaching profession in the Carmel, Fishers and Indianapolis area for as long as I can remember. I first met Sally through IPTA when I began private teaching in the early '90s. Sally, along with colleagues Sue Schultz, Susie Wolfe, Bev Strathman, were a dynamic quartet that welcomed me into the profession – referring students to me, providing mentorship and friendship, and serving as role models for what an engaged professional teacher looks like. Sally has been active in the local teacher groups for over 35 years. She was one of the pioneers of group teaching in Indianapolis in the late 1980's and 1990's, and an active member of the Indiana Group Piano Teachers. (I am fairly sure she was president of this group, but I can't verify without asking her. The group has been defunct for many years now.) Her approach to group teaching was rooted in her masters training at SMU with Louise Bianchi; Sally was influential in helping other Indiana teachers became better teachers of group piano.

Sally also served as president of GIMTA from 2006-2021 (need to verify dates). She spearheaded GIMTA's efforts to bring national pedagogues to Indy for an annual two-day workshop, including Catherine Rollin, Robert Vandall, Paul Wirth, Melody Bober, Kevin Olson, Chris Goldston and Philip Keveren. She has been a member of MTNA/IMTA since 1986.

Sally is also a long-time member of IPTA, serving as president of IPTA from 2008-2010 and 2020-2021, and IPTG (not sure if she was ever president of this group or not). Most remarkable is her commitment to lifelong learning. To this day, she continues to attend teacher meetings and conferences, always enthusiastic about what she's learning and eager to share with her students. Her students are active in recitals, festivals, competitions, and assessment programs.

Despite life-threatening health issues and challenging family obligations during the past few years (not to mention COVID), Sally remains one of the most positive teachers I've ever known. She is dedicated, committed to excellence, supportive, and truly deserving of the honor of IMTA Teacher of the Year.

Letter from Rick Latos (adult student of Sally's):

As an adult piano student, I began learning to play this fabulous instrument less than 5 year ago. When I first contacted Sally Eppert to ask if she would be available to teach me, she laughed when I mentioned that, even though I had played clarinet 60 years ago, I didn't know where middle C was located on the piano! Fast forward to my current skill set (if you can seriously call my plinking the ivories anything akin to a skill), these years working with Sally have been among the most meaningful experiences of my life. All joking aside, Sally's exuberant personality and constant support have instilled in me a true sense of enjoyment of music that was hidden for most of my life.

Sally has not only endured and conquered a life-threatening illness, but she has provided me and I suspect, all her other students, with an appreciation of what hard work and perseverance can do to help in one's personal growth. It is one thing to tolerate endless hours of student nonperformance, but quite another to constantly smile and encourage her students to keep on trying (kind of like Dori's attitude in *Finding Nemo*..."Keep on swimming, keep on swimming!"). Sally keeps on learning – new teaching techniques, and countless personal new styles of playing. Throughout the many years of her teaching career, she has mentored other teachers and has inspired hundreds of her students to appreciate the joy in creating their own music, not just playing what others c\have composed.

It is a true pleasure and honor for me to participate in helping Sally Eppert to receive well-deserved recognition as a music teacher and educator. At a time when all of us struggle to find importance in our lives, she continues to lead us to greater things, among the most beautiful of these is a love for the peace and satisfaction of playing music.
